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1 INTRODUCTION

Sakhalin Energy Investment Company Ltd. (Sakhalin Energy) considers regular and meaningful engagement with the public and key stakeholders, as well as public disclosure of relevant project information, to be important elements for the successful development of the Sakhalin-2 project (the project). To this end, since very beginning Sakhalin Energy has actively sought to engage with stakeholders and provide information about its activities.

This document describes Sakhalin Energy's public consultations and the disclosure of information as of 31 December 2019, and includes:

2 CONSULTATION AND INFORMATION DISCLOSURE IN 2019: SCOPE AND FEEDBACK

2.1 Consultations carried out in 2019: general information

2.2 Stakeholder engagement within framework of sustainable development report preparation

In 2009 Sakhalin Energy decided to follow the public non-financial reporting requirements of the Global Reporting Initiative (GRI) (www.globalreporting.org).

Sustainable development report covers the results of Sakhalin Energy activities, including environmental protection, personnel development, stakeholder engagement, social projects and other aspects. Sustainable development report is available in public domain at the company's official website, Sakhalin Energy's information centres, located in the Sakhalin communities, company's office in Korsakov and is widely distributed among the company's stakeholders.

As part of preparation of the reports, the company commits to hold regular consultations with stakeholders, so they can share their opinions on the company's activity and make recommendations on further development of the company's responsibility in production, environment and social areas.

Consultations are conducted in a form of dialogue twice a year. During the first round of a dialogue the company presents preliminary information on the company's activities for the reporting period to stakeholders. Participants of the dialogue comment and discuss what additional information of wide audience interest might be included into the report, ask questions. During the second round of the dialogue the company responds to the stakeholders' comments and questions received during the first round

of the dialogue. Results of consultations are included into sustainable development report of the corresponding reporting period.

Stakeholders involved in these dialogues are local communities, NGOs, authorities, social organisations, experts that usually engage with Sakhalin Energy on the economic, environment, social issues and other areas of sustainable development. Direct written invitation method is used to contact the participants prior to the dialogues as well as open invitations via regional newspapers and/or internet resources. In addition, the company invites stakeholders to contribute to sustainable development reporting through a questionnaire.

In 2019 the company conducted two rounds of the dialogue:

- February 2019 – the second round of the dialogue under 2018 sustainable development report preparation, where the company answered questions and comments received during the first round of the dialogue. Summary of dialogues within the framework of 2018 sustainable development report is included into the report (see the Appendix 2 “Comments and Suggestions of Stakeholders on Individual Aspects, Indicators and/or Programmes and The Company’s Response and Commitments” of 2018 report on the company’s website:
http://www.sakhalinenergy.ru/upload/iblock/416/SahalinReport2019ENG_WE B.pdf).
- November 2019 – the first round of the dialogue under 2019 sustainable development report preparation, where the company presented to stakeholders information on the company’s activities and achievements for the reporting period.

Also, in November-December 2019 under the preparation of the report for 2019, detailed consultations were conducted with all key groups of stakeholders, including shareholders, customers, government authorities, lenders, company staff, contractors, NGOs, community, etc. The main methods of engagement were survey (including forms distribution via e-mail to stakeholders, staff survey, on-line form on the company’s website) and face to face meetings. In addition, there was survey under annual public meetings.

The summaries of stakeholders’ dialogues and other consultations listed above within 2019 sustainable development report preparation will be included into the report, Appendix 2.

In April 2019 the company conducted a public presentation of 2018 sustainable development report in Moscow. Representatives of scientific and expert community, federal and regional authorities, business, indigenous people, NGOs and other society representatives and mass-media attended the presentation.

Successful public endorsement of the 2018 sustainable development report conducted by non-financial reporting Council of Russian Union of industrialists and entrepreneurs (RSPP) became a major milestone. As it underlined in the RSPP conclusion, the report “contains important information, covers all key areas of responsible business practice in compliance with the principles of Russian Business Social Charter and with sufficient completeness of information on the company’s activities in these areas”. RSPP conclusion and certificate are available in the Sustainable Development Report (Appendixes 7 and 8).

2.3 Consultation and information disclosure in project affected communities

Sakhalin Energy endeavoured to ensure that the people and groups it consulted with were representative and inclusive of vulnerable groups; respect local traditions and

cultural norms in discussions and decision-making; and that face-to-face meetings arranged are varied and create conditions that encourage wide and diverse participation.

2.3.1 Public meetings

In 2019 Sakhalin Energy conducted public meetings in 15 communities. The reports about the meetings and concerns raised by the communities can be found on company's website <http://www.sakhalinenergy.ru/en/social/pr/>. Please refer to the Table 2 in Section 2.1. for more details.

The information on date, time and venue for the public meetings were announced in key Sakhalin newspapers (as listed in the Table 4 in Section 2.5) three weeks prior to the public meeting. The timetable of the meetings was available on the company's website <http://www.sakhalinenergy.ru/en/social/community/>.

2.3.2 Public hearings

In 2019 the company held four public hearings:

- Production wells PA-131, PA-133, PA-135 with a six-casing design at Astokh section of the Piltun-Astokhskoye oil and gas condensate field (group 9).
- Depreservation and continue construction of operating well PB-418 at the Piltun area of the Piltun-Astokhskoye oil and gas condensate field.
- Comprehensive marine engineering survey programme to ensure the installation and operation of the self-elevating floating drilling rig for prospecting and appraisal drilling at the Lunskoye license field.
- Addition to the technical project for the construction and operation of underground facilities not related to resources extraction for the purpose of disposing of drilling waste and other liquids in the Astokh section of the Piltun-Astokhskoye oil and gas condensate field.

For all hearings the company together with contractors developed a design package, which included impact assessment according to international and Russian requirements. All announcements for community on public hearings including location of materials available for public were published in the local newspapers (depending on the district), Sakhalin Oblast newspaper (Gubernskiye vedomosti), federal newspaper (Rossiyskaya gazeta) within the terms established by the RF legislation.

2.3.2.1 Production wells PA-131, PA-133, PA-135 with a six-casing design at Astokh section of the Piltun-Astokhskoye oil and gas condensate field (group 9)

The aim of the proposed activity is the construction of new wells at the Piltun-Astokhskoye field. Relevant public hearings were held in January 2019 in the Nogliki and Okha. Appropriate notifications about the hearings and materials publications/they availability were made in December 2018 as per RF requirements. In total 40 participants attended the meetings (Nogliki – 20, Okha – 20).

The questions at the meetings were about the potential negative impact to the environment and birds in particular, about the presence of specially protected natural reservations nearby the platform, drilling and platforms' technical characteristics, work shifts at the platform. All the questions were addressed during the meetings.

The positive State Environmental Expert Review conclusion was obtained for the project in June 2019.

2.3.2.2 Depreservation and continue construction of operating well PB-418 at the Piltun area of the Piltun-Astokhskoye oil and gas condensate field.

The aim of the proposed activity is the depreservation and continue construction of operating well at the Piltun-Astokhskoye field. Relevant public hearings were held in June 2019 in the Nogliki and Okha. Appropriate notifications about the hearings and materials publications/they availability were made in May 2019 as per RF requirements. In total 41 participants attended the meetings (Nogliki – 16, Okha – 25).

The questions at the meetings were about the preservation of critically endangered species (Stellars Sea Eagle in particular), cases of gray whales in the nets, place of the public hearings, possibility of provision of the State Environmental Expert Review conclusion to the Nogliki Administration, drilling wastes management and approvals process of the design documentation for the well. All the questions were addressed during the meetings.

The State Environmental Expert Review conclusion approval is expected in 2020.

2.3.2.3 Comprehensive marine engineering survey programme to ensure the installation and operation of the self-elevating floating drilling rig for prospecting and appraisal drilling at the Lunskoye license field.

The aim of the proposed activity is carrying out comprehensive marine engineering survey programme to ensure the installation and operation of the self-elevating floating drilling rig for prospecting and appraisal drilling at the Lunskoye license field. Relevant public hearings were held in October 2019 in the Nogliki and Okha. Appropriate notifications about the hearings and materials publications/they availability were made in August 2019 as per RF requirements. In total 28 participants attended the meetings (Nogliki – 17, Okha – 11).

The questions at the meetings were about the use of cesium magnetometers, the potential impact of drilling operations on cooling down of hot springs, separate public hearings for well drilling, sampling technology, environmental compensation measures, control of state authorities during the planned works. All the questions were addressed during the meetings.

The State Environmental Expert Review conclusion approval is expected in 2020.

2.3.2.4 Addition to the technical project for the construction and operation of underground facilities not related to resources extraction for the purpose of disposing of drilling waste and other liquids in the Astokh section of the Piltun-Astokhskoye oil and gas condensate field.

The aim of the proposed activity is placement of drilling waste and other fluids in rock formations. Relevant public hearings were held in December 2019 in the Nogliki and Okha. Appropriate notifications about the hearings and materials publications/they availability were made in October 2019 as per RF requirements. In total 24 participants attended the meetings (Nogliki – 13, Okha – 11).

The questions at the meetings were about the economics of the waste disposal technology, what will happen with wastes in future, where exactly the wastes are disposed, why such technology is not applied in case of onshore drilling. All the questions were addressed during the meetings.

The State Environmental Expert Review conclusion approval is expected in 2020.

2.3.3 Consultations and information disclosure with residents in the vicinity of

Prigorodnoye complex accommodation facilities

In 2019 the company specialists held three meetings (in August) with Korsakov residents living in close proximity to Prigorodnoye complex accommodation facilities under social impact monitoring programme in order to identify potential concerns and impacts and increase awareness about Community Grievance Procedure and the company's contacts in case of questions, etc. One resident raised concerns regarding lack of major drain when the road was built near the Prigorodnoye complex accommodation and residents' houses; therefore, when it rains, it floods the territory. On the other hand, the respondent pointed that this was an old problem and they understood that could not be resolved, because then they have to remove the fence. One respondent had a question regarding temporary cut off the water (if the same situation was at the Prigorodnoye complex accommodation). The question was responded (not related to Sakhalin Energy in particular to the Prigorodnoye complex accommodation).

2.3.4 Consultation and information disclosure via Community Liaison Structure

2.3.4.1 General

As a result of 2014 restructuring, the community liaison organisation was re-configured into a community liaison structure.

Key role in the Community Liaison Structure of the company is played by two teams within the Corporate Affairs Division: Communication and Media Relations Subdivision and Social Performance Subdivision. Specialists of the above teams provide community liaison services in compliance with their job descriptions.

The Sakhalin Energy community liaison structure also includes:

- 23 information centres based in the local village and district libraries.
- Two Community Liaison Specialists (SIM Engagement Specialist and Korsakov Community Liaison Specialist).

2.3.4.2 Information Centres

As in previous years, an efficient means of engagement with the Sakhalin population was a network of 23 information centres based on district and rural libraries and located in settlements along the pipeline route and in the vicinity of other company's facilities. The information about the company information centres was published in key Sakhalin newspapers (the list of newspapers is provided in the Table 3 in Section 2.3.5), posted on the company's information boards and on the company's website. Thanks to the information centres Sakhalin Energy established an effective system of receiving feedback from communities residing in close vicinity to Sakhalin Energy assets. On the regular basis Sakhalin Energy provided information materials to affected communities via company's information centres, including the following types of materials:

- corporate news-bulletin Vesti,
- annual PCDP and PCDR,
- sustainable development report,
- grievance procedure leaflets,
- posters with information on social programmes, etc.

Community residents had an opportunity to contact the company's information centre

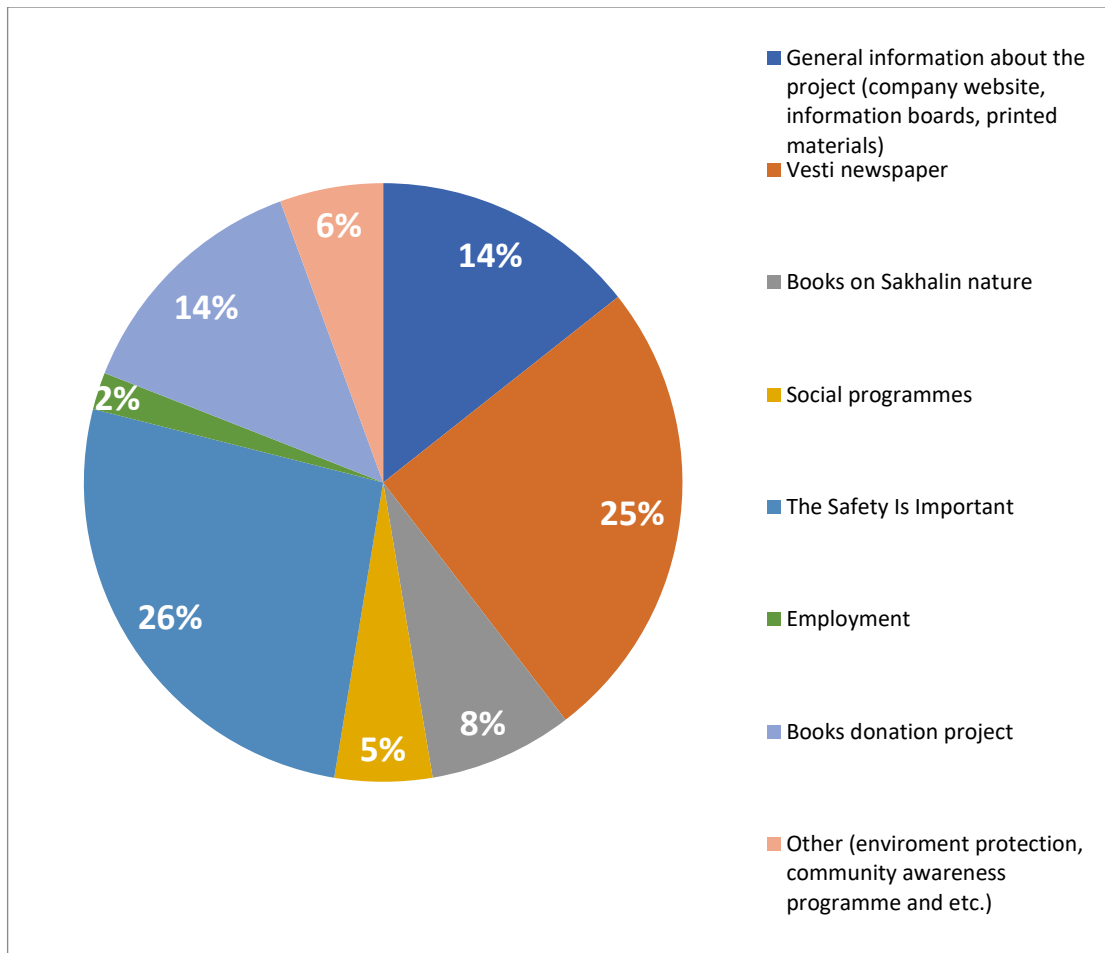
consultants any time during the regular library business hours at their convenience. The list of company's information centres is maintained on Sakhalin Energy website and in 2019 Sustainable Development report in Appendix 2 (see the report on the company's website: http://www.sakhalinenergy.ru/en/media/sd_report/).

In December 2019, information centre consultants participated in a regular annual training workshop to gain better knowledge of the company's activity. The workshop programme included the following key topics:

- Overview of the Sakhalin-2 project.
- Information centres: results of activity and plans for 2020.
- Sakhalin Energy's public non-financial reporting: sustainable development report.
- OPF compression station project.
- UN Sustainable Development Goals.
- Grievance procedure.
- Fund of Social Initiatives "Energy".
- "Safety at home" board game.
- Environmental impact management in the development of Sakhalin-2 projects' offshore oil and gas fields
- Book donation project.

6033 people visited Sakhalin Energy's information centres in 2019.

The main questions that have been asked through Sakhalin Energy's information centres are shown on the diagram below (on the results of the information centres work). Majority of people expressed their interest in the company's information materials including the company's website and corporate news-bulletin *Vesti* as well as the Safety is important programme.



2.3.4.3 Community Liaison Officers

Since February 2017 there was opened CLO office in Korsakov. CLO has open hours twice a week. There were 169 visitors of Korsakov CLO office in 2019. The most popular questions are employment, participation in SD projects, etc.

In 2019 IP CLO's open hours were held in Val and Nogliki and other IP districts with local residents and IP representatives (265 visitors). The raised questions were participation in company's social programmes, SIMDP programmes/projects, employment, etc.

2.3.5 Consultations and information disclosure with members of gardeners' non-commercial partnership "Stroitel"

Throughout 2019 Sakhalin Energy continued engagement with dacha community and responded to queries or questions during consultations with the community leader and other representatives. In addition, Sakhalin Energy continued implementing the quality of life monitoring (including air quality and noise levels monitoring) during the dacha season, i.e. May-October, as required under the HSESAP and which is open to the dacha residents through presence during the measurements. The results of the monitoring were regularly reported to the chairman of the dacha community.

2.3.7 Community awareness programme

In 2019 Sakhalin Energy continued the information campaign as part of the community awareness programme on the rules of safe behaviour at the onshore pipeline and optic fiber cable safety zone.

The campaign involved publication of articles explaining the rules of the safe behaviour at the onshore pipeline and optic fiber cable safety zone in district newspapers four times in 2019 (the list of the newspapers is provided in the Table 4). Also, this information was included in the presentation provided during public meetings in district centres of key project-affected communities in 2019 (details on the meetings are provided in the Table 2). Besides, Onshore Pipeline Department issued individual letters to all land users (including organisations and private households) in the onshore pipeline vicinity with explanation of the rules of the safe behaviour at the onshore pipeline safety zone. In addition, in May 2019 Sakhalin Energy employees held the forum dedicated to safe organisation of work when crossing the Sakhalin Energy oil and gas pipelines. The event was attended by representatives of oil and gas, telecommunications, energy companies, district authorities and others – around 50 persons. The participants exchanged views on the theme of the forum and asked questions.

2.3.8 Public opinion survey

The annual public opinion survey is one of the monitoring tools to ascertain public attitude towards the project. In 2019 the survey was conducted in 14 Sakhalin communities, which are situated in close vicinity of the project activities. Individual interviews with a questionnaire serve as a primary method of the survey. No significant issues or impacts under Sakhalin-2 project were identified as a result of 2019 survey.

2.4 Indigenous stakeholders

In 2019 the company continued its regular engagement with representatives of Sakhalin indigenous communities in the areas of traditional indigenous residence and traditional economic activities. Following the recommendations received at the SIMDP development stage, the partners put special emphasis on raising public awareness of ongoing programmes and opportunities they would offer. For this purpose, the

following was done in 2019:

- Public meetings were held with Sakhalin indigenous people (publicly, in groups and individually).
- Sakhalin indigenous minorities development plan's website was extensively used (www.simdp.ru).
- Regular information bulletin and other plan-related printed materials (leaflets, etc.) were issued and distributed among the stakeholders' community.
- Updated and distributed documentations on the information boards, sent documents to the stakeholders (members of Regulatory Bodies of the plan, non-governmental organisations, tribal communities and municipal authorities, IP specialists of administrations) in 13 communities: Okha, Nekrasovka, Val, Nogliki, Tymovskoye, Chir-Unvd, Aleksandrovsk-Sakhalinsky, Viakhtu, Trambaus, Smirnykh, Buyukly, Poronaisk, Yuzhno-Sakhalinsk.
- Individual consultations were provided regarding applications for financial support, participation in programmes and projects implementation under the SIMDP.
- Conducted CLO open hours in traditional areas of indigenous residence (see section 2.3.4).
- Issued press-release, published articles, media coverage of events concerning Sakhalin IP.

In February 2019 representatives of the Regional Council of IP authorised representatives, Sakhalin Energy and Sakhalin Oblast Government had public meetings and meetings with representatives of IP, municipal authorities, NGOs and IP community in 12 settlements of traditional indigenous residence and economic activities (15 meetings). In particular, the participants were informed about SIMDP 3 implementation for 2018 and 2019, grievance procedure related to the plan, programmes of SIMDP 3, announcement of a grant contests under traditional economic activities support programme, and social development fund update and events for 2018. Then there were discussions of the above topics and other issues related to implementation and management of the plan at large and some of its programmes. A total of 200 people joined the discussion.

The SIMDP internal monitoring of 68 projects was held in February 2019 in 9 communities. In November-December 2019 internal and external monitoring was held.

2.5 Consultations and disclosure in other Sakhalin communities

Sakhalin Energy provided information on the company's public website: www.sakhalinenergy.ru (Russian) and www.sakhalinenergy.com (English). Web sites of the company's key social programmes were maintained (SIMDP – www.simdp.ru, The Safety is Important – www.senya-spatatel.ru, Fund Energy – www.fondenergy.ru, Korsakov Partnership Council – www.korsakovsovet.ru).

Sakhalin residents could also use the two main Sakhalin Island newspapers (Gubernskiye Vedomosti and Sovetsky Sakhalin) as well as leading electronic information agencies (IA "Sakh.com", TIA "Ostrova", RIA "Sakhalin-Kurily", IA "Citysakh", IA "SakhalinMedia") for details of project news. In addition, project news and information relevant to specific communities were published in the following 11 district newspapers.

In 2019 the company published on the company's public websites and newspapers the project updates, information about social projects events, public meetings

2.6 Engagement with community and other non-governmental organisations

The annual public consultation and disclosure report, sustainable development report and other publications that may be of interest were provided during the course of the year. Company sent it in a proactive manner and upon requests. Details of these publications' distribution see in sections 2.2, 2.3.4, 2.3.6, 2.5, 2.7.2, Appendix 3 of this report.

During 2019 the company continued its regular engagement with community and non-governmental organisations as follows:

- Sakhalin based NGOs participated in the dialogs with stakeholders under sustainable development report preparation (twice a year, see section 2.2. As part of the first round of a dialogue with stakeholders under the 2019 sustainable development report preparation the representative of the Yuzhno-Sakhalinsk indigenous people community emphasised the need of the indigenous peoples representatives participation in the events on business and indigenous peoples engagement (note: in the view of the event on business and indigenous peoples engagement that held for the first time as part of 2019 International Sakhalin Oil & Gas Conference; the company responded that the question should be addressed to the event organisers; Sakhalin Energy was not among them).
- Cooperation with the Western Gray Whale Advisory Panel (during the year) in developing optimal solutions to minimise the impact on whales. During these meetings company's the Western Gray Whale Advisory Panel' representatives discussed the implementation of the corporate Marine Mammal Protection Plan (MMPP), updated in 2018 (see 2018 SD report, section 6.6 and 8.3.10 http://www.sakhalinenergy.ru/en/media/sd_report/).
- Cooperation with NGOs and social institutions within the framework of Social Development/Social Investment company's programmes/projects. Meetings were held routinely under SD/SI projects and programmes. During these meetings company's and NGOs and social institutions' representatives discussed the implementation of the social projects. Also, the representatives of NGOs and social institutions participated in various events under SD/SI

projects and programmes (see section 2.4 and 2018 SD report, section 9.5 http://www.sakhalinenergy.ru/en/media/sd_report/).

- Cooperation with IP NGOs and organisations in framework of SIMDP and other programmes/projects. During these meetings company's and IP NGOs and organisations' representatives discussed the implementation of the SIMDP projects and programmes/projects. Also, the representatives of NGOs and social institutions participated in the SIMDP projects and programmes/projects events (see 2018 SD report, sections 6.5 and 9.5.6 http://www.sakhalinenergy.ru/en/media/sd_report/).

2.7.3 Public consultation activities in Japan

During 2018 the company undertook a number of consultation and engagement activities in Japan.

Key stakeholder activities in 2019:

- 18-19 February – a meeting with representatives of Okhotsk Environmental Protection Net in Mombetsu to discuss implementation of the Sakhalin-2 project and preparedness for oil spill response. The Sakhalin Energy specialists from Corporate Affairs Department participated in the meeting. There were no questions or issues raised during the meetings.
- 26 September - engagement session with Hokkaido Fishery organisations and Hokkaido Authorities including Rumoi Coast Guard in Rumoi regarding implementation of the Sakhalin-2 project and preparedness for oil spill response.
- 26 September – participation in the Safety and Disaster Prevention Council Meeting for the Projects in Sakhalin and Navigation of Tankers in Rumoi. Before the meeting the company's representatives from Treasury department were involved to observe the OSR exercise in Rumoi settlement. Both events were also attended by Sakhalin-1 project representatives, buyers and shipping companies working with Sakhalin-2 project Following OSR Exercise whereby a scenario of oil spill from a Sakhalin vessel was worked through, the organizer, Japan Coast Guard and the Head of Hokkaido Fishery Association expressed appreciation for Sakhalin Energy's attendance and respect demonstrated for managing OSR issues. They highlighted a continuously high level of concern for the risks associated with Sakhalin-2 Project hydrocarbon shipping arrangements and expressed a hope for continued cooperativeness in this respect. The followed meeting was aimed at receiving updates by the parties with regards to the OSR arrangements in the area of Hokkaido and nearby offshore areas. It was attended by the same participants as for the OSR exercise. Sakhalin-2 update was well received without any direct questions raised with regards to the information presented.

A review of the engagement activities in Japan has been undertaken internally at the end of Q4 2019 to determine the 2020 programme. The company has decided to continue the engagement.

2.8 Media and other interest groups

Sakhalin Energy's Corporate Affairs Department communicated regularly with representatives of the mass media as well as other interest groups such as educational and research institutions.

In 2019 representatives of Communication, Stakeholder Engagement and Event Management Subdivision conducted two media briefings.

Media were invited to participate in media briefings or other meetings via invitation letters, by telephone, and email.

3 COMMUNITY GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

3.1 Reporting grievances

On regular basis the company distributes a community grievance leaflet, which advises those with a grievance on how they can lodge a grievance relating to Sakhalin-2 project activities. The community grievance leaflet and posters were revised in 2018 to include the up-to-date contact details. The leaflet and posters were issued and distributed among stakeholders in accordance with the plan of the information campaign on grievance procedure in 2019.

In 2019 the company ran a regular campaign on advertising of the grievance procedure aimed at distributing information on the grievance procedure among communities and contractors/subcontractors' employees. These included:

- Distribution of leaflets and posters in all project affected communities and among the contractors/subcontractors' employees (for example, offices at facilities, camps, etc.).
- Distribution of pocket calendars with information about the community grievance procedure in project affected communities.
- Districts newspaper announcements.
- A dedicated slide in every community presentation.
- Trainings for contractors to introduce community grievance procedure.

The grievance leaflet is also disseminated in Japan as part of the PCDP available in Japanese.

3.2 Grievance addressing in 2019

In 2019 the company received 33 grievances. Among grievances received in 2019, 49% were raised in connection with labour relations (contractor organisations); 21% – issues on camp management; 12% – issues on code of conduct, 15% – SIMDP implementation, 3% - impact on communities. For more information see the Table 6 below:

* Code of conduct related grievances – examples: workers complain about contractor's supervisors using offensive language towards their subordinates, workers complain about being treated differently by their management.

* Impact on community – grievance from local land user regarding damages to the nearby road caused by the company’s contractors.

As of end of 2019, 24 grievances were addressed. Of them 19 grievances were resolved with statements of satisfaction signed by complainants. For other grievances all practical measures have been taken by the company aimed to attain a resolution, however either a complainant did not express his/her opinion regarding the actions taken (one grievance) or complainants did not agree with the company’s explanations (four grievances). These grievances were closed through business integrity committee decision, in accordance with the grievance procedure.

Besides, in 2019 the company addressed 11 grievances that had been received at the end of 2018. 1 grievance was resolved with exceeding the time stipulated in grievance procedure (due to delayed communication with project team and contractor’s organisation). Other grievances were addressed within the period stipulated by the procedure. Out of these 11 grievances nine were resolved with statements of satisfaction signed by complainants. For other two grievances all practical measures have been taken by the company aimed to attain a resolution, however complainants did not express his/her opinion regarding the actions taken. These grievances were closed through business integrity committee decision, in accordance with the grievance procedure.

Nine grievances were remained unresolved as per the end of 2019.

As a regular practice, the company has kept monitoring and analysing the level of complainants’ satisfaction with the grievance resolution and with the process of addressing the grievance.

3.3 Grievance procedure within the frame of Sakhalin indigenous minorities development plan

In 2019 partners of the plan continued to inform community about SIMDP grievance procedure (under the public meetings, during individual consultations, etc.). Besides, the information on grievance procedure is available in all communities of traditional indigenous residence and IP traditional economic activities (information materials about the grievance procedure were placed on the information boards and also available in non-governmental organisations, libraries, on website of the programme).

In 2019 five grievances were submitted as part of the SIMDP grievance procedure (decision on projects financing under of SIMDP programs and the activities of the SIMDP coordinating bodies). As of end of 2019 all grievances were addressed, for four grievances complainant signed the statement of satisfaction, for one grievance the governing body of the SIMDP has made a decision to close the grievance since all actions required by SIMDP were implemented.

These grievances were reviewed by members of the SIMDP grievance team according to the SIMDP grievance procedure. The status and results of these grievances resolving were controlled by the SIMDP Governing Board and the SIMDP external monitor.
